

POLICY FOR ACADEMIC CERTIFICATION QUICK REFERENCE GUIDE

Purpose: The NCAA Eligibility Center conducts academic certifications based on the approved core courses (per NCAA Bylaw 14.3.1.2) at each respective high school the student attends. The NCAA Eligibility Center's High School Review staff reviews core-course submissions and maintains a list of NCAA core courses for high schools and programs that have been reviewed and approved. Titled "List of NCAA-Approved Core Courses" (CCL), this list is located on the High School Portal.

This document explains how the academic certification staff uses the CCL, official high school transcripts (HST) and departmental operating procedures to determine which courses may be included in a prospective student-athlete's academic certification.

Core-Course Analysis

Core-course analysis (CCA) means finding an appropriate course title on a high school's CCL for the title reported on the HST. Below is the hierarchy of steps for CCA in locating an appropriate match on the CCL.

- 1. Verbatim Title and Academic Level of Rigor Match: When selecting course titles to use in an academic certification, staff will attempt to match the course title on the transcript with a verbatim course title on the high school's approved CCL. This is a best-case scenario. Please match your title word-for-word to how it is represented on your transcript.
- 2. **Verbatim Title with Allowable Academic Level of Rigor Substitution Match:** When an exact course title match is available, but the academic level or rigor does not match, using the verbatim course-title match, staff will determine if there is an acceptable academic level of rigor substitution available. See Academic Level of Rigor Table.
- 3. **Root Word Match:** If an exact course title match is unavailable, staff will review the root word to determine if the root of word(s) comprising the course title is present and eligible to be entered into the certification. Any unknown word that is not a clear root word, Academic Level of Rigor, or acceptable designation will not be considered. See **Root Word Chart**.
- 4. **Course-Title Substitution Chart:** When an exact course title match is unavailable, staff will review the titles appearing on the CCL to determine whether a course-title substitution is available for one course title to be entered into the certification in place of another course title. See the **Course-Title Substitution Chart**.

Important Core-Course Analysis Restrictions/Exceptions

The charts below highlight important exceptions/restrictions staff adhere to when dealing with interdisciplinary coursework, duplicative coursework, "ok thru" dates and other CCL notes.

Note: Information obtained from a high school or program may supersede the policies within this document, based on the specific circumstance of the high school or program.

Academic Level of Rigor Table

When an exact course title match is available, but the academic level of rigor does not match, using the verbatim course title match, staff will determine if there is an acceptable academic level of rigor substitution available.

Guiding Principles

- » Staff will attempt to match an appropriate course title on a school's CCL for the title reported on the high school transcript.
- » Staff must review each of the following on an HST to determine if there is an acceptable match on the CCL:
 - Full course titles (e.g. Biology).
 - Root Word course titles (e.g. W Hist = World History).

- Abbreviated course titles/acronyms (e.g. TOK = Theory of Knowledge, POD = Principles of Democracy).
- » If the CCL reports a verbatim course or root word course title as "Not Approved," the core-course analysis ends and that course cannot be used.

Note: Academic levels of rigor can *always* be dopped down to a lower tier; but can never be bumped up to a higher tier.

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Root Word Chart

If an exact course title match is unavailable, staff will review the root word to determine if the root of word(s) comprising the course title is present and eligible to be entered into the certification. Any unknown word that is not a clear root word, academic level of rigor, or acceptable designation will not be considered.

Guiding Principles

- » **Root Word Definition:** The root of word(s) comprising a course title is present on the HST and/or CCL.
- » Any root in the same row is an acceptable match.
- » This is a two-way chart, meaning the root word can appear either on the HST or CCL.
- » This is not an exhaustive list, meaning if there are additional clear root word matches, the course title is okay to use.
- » If the CCL reports a verbatim course or root word course title as "Not Approved," the core-course analysis ends, and that course cannot be used.

Course-Title Substitution Chart

When an exact course title match is unavailable, staff will review the titles appearing on the CCL to determine whether a course-title substitution is available for one course title to be entered into the certification in place of another course title.

Guiding Principles

- » Any course appearing in the same row can be substituted for one another:
 - *Example:* Anatomy = Physiology.
 - *Example:* Anatomy & Physiology = A&P.
- » This is a two-way resource, meaning an approved substitute title can appear either on the HST or CCL.
 - *Example:* HST to the CCL: (HST reports "English Literature," matching CCL substitution: "British Lit").
 - *Example:* CCL to the HST (HST reports "Brit Lit," matching CCL substitution: "English Literature").
- » Root Word matches allowed.
 - *Example:* Probability and Statistics = Stat.
 - *Example:* Gov = Civics.
- » "Academic Level of Rigor" and "Grade-Level Substitutions" tables must always be considered.
- » If the CCL reports a verbatim course or root word course title as "Not Approved," the core-course analysis ends and that course cannot be used.

Dual Enrollment Analysis

College or dual enrollment (DE) coursework may be considered in a student's academic certification. A dual enrollment course is a core course that was taken for grade/credit through a college program that appears on a high school transcript.

Guiding Principles

» Dual enrollment coursework must appear on a HST with grade/credit.

- » Dual enrollment coursework must be clearly designated as a dual enrollment course on the HST.
